

Bill of IOWA VOTING RIGHTS

Voting Rights for Iowans

If I am at least 18 years old and am registered to vote in Iowa, I have the right to vote in elections.

I have the right to vote by myself or with help. I can choose who I want to assist me unless it is my employer, employer's agent, or an officer of my union.

Even if I have a conservator or guardian, I may vote unless a judge specifically said I cannot.

I have the right to vote the way I want.

I have the right to get help if someone tries to stop me from voting.

I have the right to be shown how to make my choices on my ballot.

If I am waiting in line when the poll closes, I must be allowed to vote.

If my name is not on the registration list, I must be given a provisional ballot.

If I am at the wrong precinct, I must be given my correct precinct location.

If I am in the polling place for the precinct in which I live and I have the proper identification, I have the right to register to vote on Election Day.

I have the right to check over my votes on the ballot.
